THE POLICE TRAINING CENTRE – ESTABLISHMENT

The Police Training Centre in Legionowo (PTC) was set up by order No 85 of the Minister of the Internal Affairs of 27 October 1990.

Dog Handlers and Dog Training School in Sułkowie was incorporated into the Police Training Centre in 1992, whereas the Central Vocational Training Centre for the Water Police in Kal, near Węgorzewo in 1997.

Since the PTC was established,

it has significantly changed. Structure, curricula and training methodology have been modified. Learning facilities have been modernised and extended. However, main task of the PTC remains the same – it is conducting basic training and in-service training of police officers and employees of the police. On 17 June 1995, the Centre adopted the flag, funded by the community of Legionowo.

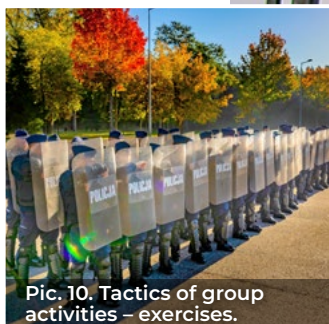

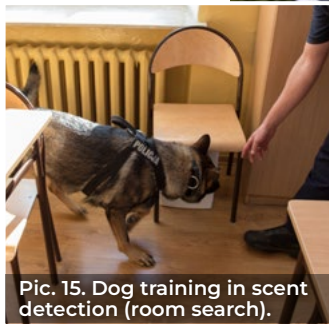

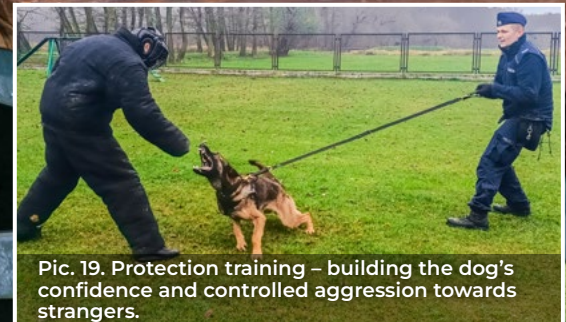

The Training Centre in Kal

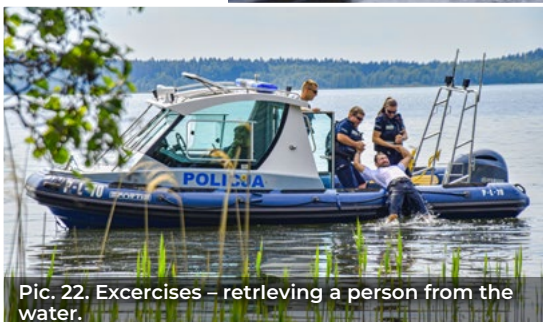
The Training Centre in Kal (near Węgorzewo) is a place where trainees of specialist courses for water police officers can improve their skills and qualifications.

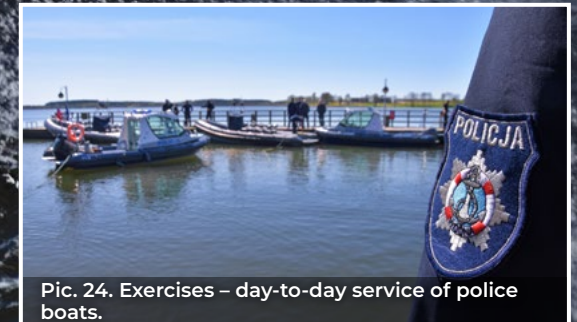

MANAGEMENT AND STRUCTURE OF THE POLICE TRAINING CENTRE



The Centre is managed by the Commandant. In order to complete statutory tasks, the structure of the Centre was divided into three divisions: staff units which are directly subor-

dinate to the Commandant, educational units managed by the Deputy Commandant for Didactics and logistics units subordinate to the Deputy Commandant for Logistics.

LEARNING FACILITIES

The learning facilities of the PTC include, among others, a police interventions hall, a sporting hall, a swimming pool, special labs, role play buildings and a shooting range. Legionowo is also location of the Police Command Centre, the aim of which is to ensure central safety management systems and information exchange during national police operations. The library is an important element that significantly improves effectiveness of training. The library stocks mainly include literature on safety and public order protection, organisation and action of the police in Poland and abroad, forensic science, criminology, law, forensics, social, economic and political sciences.

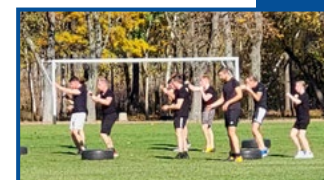
The multiplicity and diversity of specialist courses and curricula of basic vocational courses, sergeant courses, warrant officer courses assigned to the PTC by the Commander-in-Chief of the Police require the availability of modern teaching aids – adequate to the equipment used by officers on duty. Such aids include, among others: a bomb disposal manipulator, a pyrotechnic launcher, handheld mobile data terminals, a demonstration of two-circuit brake and steering system, firearms, handheld speed guns (including laser guns with and without a camera), mobile speed cameras, total stations, police motorcycles, motorboats and an Emergency Vehicle of Traffic Police.

BASIC VOCATIONAL TRAINING AND IN-SERVICE TRAINING

The Police Training Centre in Legionowo delivers basic, sergeant, warrant and officer training courses, as well as central in-service training through specialist courses and other training activities.

Basic vocational training is intended for policemen starting to work in the police. The training prepares cadets to properly and effectively conduct their duties in the basic position of preventive service, patrol and interventions units or riot police units.

Sergeant, warrant and commissioned officer training courses prepare police officers for roles requiring the respective level of professional qualification.

Central in-service training

Central in-service training is conducted in the form of specialist courses and other activities. It aims at acquiring, updating, developing and expanding knowledge and skills required to conduct duties and tasks by police officers. It also gives opportunity to grant additional instructor endorsements.

The PTC, as the only police school in Poland, conducts in-service training in: bomb disposal and pyrotechnic actions, water police, examination of traffic and construction disaster sites, riding road motorcycles and cars, servi-

ce dog training and surveillance. Not only police officers and employees participate in the above mentioned courses. They are also conducted for representatives of other uniformed services e.g. the Internal Security Agency, the Foreign Intelligence Agency, the State Fire Service, the State Protection Service and soldiers from units of the Polish Army.

The Police Training Centre in Legionowo is responsible for conducting 85 kinds of specialist courses (37 of them are organised only by the PTC). A few of them are listed below.

In-service training in prevention

includes, among others, specialist courses:

- ▶ for police duty officers,
- ▶ in counteracting domestic violence,
- ▶ for policemen-spotters,
- ▶ in actions for minors and counteracting demoralisation and juvenile delinquency,
- ▶ for police officers responsible for escorting persons and conveying and protecting the secure mail,
- ▶ for community police officers.

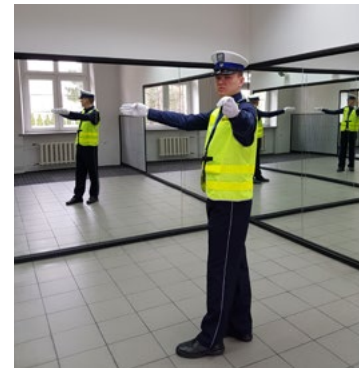

In-service training for traffic police

includes, among others, specialist courses:

- ▶ in road traffic,
- ▶ in riding road motorcycles,
- ▶ in improving driving technique,
- ▶ in using mobile speed cameras,
- ▶ in controlling digital tachographs,
- ▶ in using handheld speed guns.

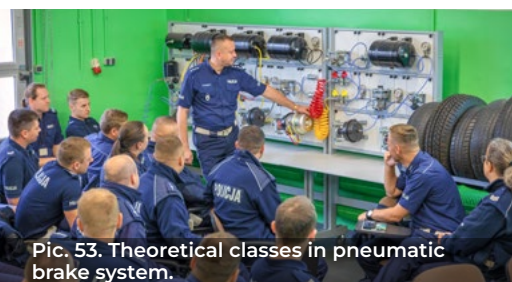

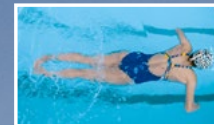
In-service training in actions on water

- ▶ for police officers performing tasks on water and in water-side areas,
- ▶ for police officers operating police boats in difficult weather conditions.

In-service training in tactics and intervention techniques and police shooting

includes, among others, specialist courses:

- ▶ in the field of tactics and intervention techniques,
- ▶ for police officers taking interventions against aggressive and dangerous persons,
- ▶ for police officers executing apprehensions of dangerous criminals,
- ▶ for instructors of police shooting,
- ▶ for instructors of police shootings in police anti-terrorist units/sections,
- ▶ in the field of handling fire-arms in conditions of increased stress,
- ▶ in the field of skills developing for instructors of police shooting.

In-service training in forensic science

includes, among others, specialist courses:

- ▶ for forensic technicians,
- ▶ for police officers executing tasks at the traffic incident scene,
- ▶ in the field of organizing and conducting inspections of traffic and construction disasters scene,
- ▶ in the field of operation of tacheometer,
- ▶ for police officers managing crime scene examinations units.

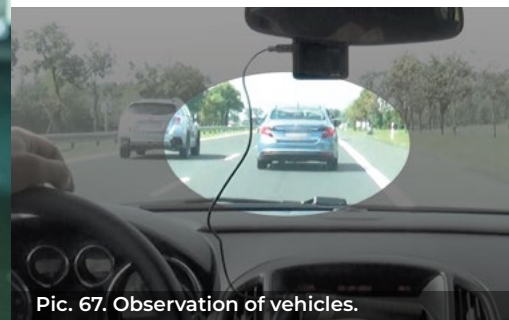

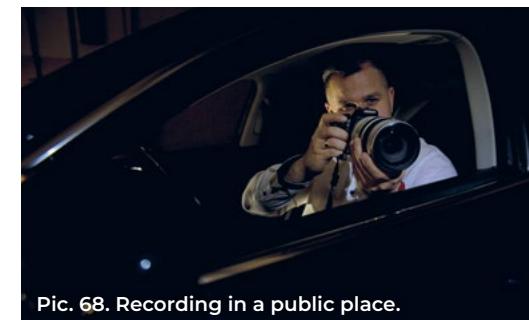
In-service training in surveillance technique

includes, among others, specialist courses:

- ▶ in the field of foot surveillance,
- ▶ in the field of mobile surveillance,
- ▶ in the field of operational control.

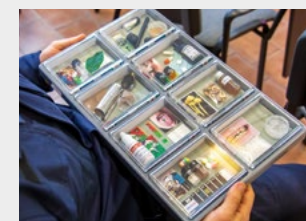

In-service training in criminal service

includes, among others, specialist courses:

- ▶ in the field of combating drug crime,
- ▶ in the field of neutralization of illegal drug laboratories,
- ▶ in the field of tactics and interrogation techniques,
- ▶ in the field of obtaining the Internet information for police officers combating computer crime,
- ▶ in the field of actions aimed at securing property with elements of supervision over these actions,
- ▶ for police officers in the field of using IT resources of Police National Information System (Polish: KSIP), other police systems, non-police systems and National Crime Information Centre (Polish: KCIK),
- ▶ for police officers acting as auxiliary prosecutors,
- ▶ for police officers acting as disciplinary officers,
- ▶ for persons carrying out tasks in the units competent for control matters in the Police.

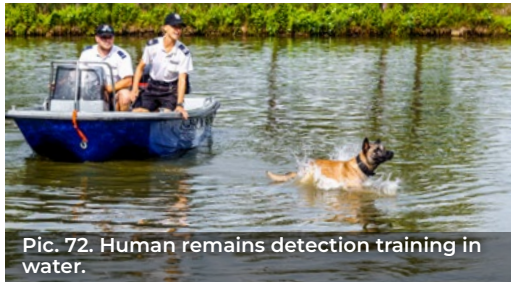


Pic. 69-71. Teaching materials and dummy substances used during exercises in specialist courses in the field of criminal service.

Professional development in police dog handling

Included specialist courses for candidates for dog handlers and for active service dog handlers in the following categories:

- ▶ patrol and tracking dogs,
- ▶ tracking dogs,
- ▶ patrol dogs,
- ▶ drug detection dogs,
- ▶ explosives detection dogs,
- ▶ firearms and ammunition detection dogs,
- ▶ human remains detection dogs (land),
- ▶ human remains detection dogs (water),
- ▶ tactical dogs,
- ▶ scent identification,
- ▶ mantrailing (level I-III).

In-service training in the field of bomb disposal and pyrotechnic actions

includes, among others, specialist courses:

- ▶ in the field of bomb disposal and pyrotechnic reconnaissance,
- ▶ in the field of independent conducting of bomb disposal and pyrotechnic actions,
- ▶ in the field of post-blast investigation,
- ▶ for bomb disposal and pyrotechnic experts – candidates for instructors.

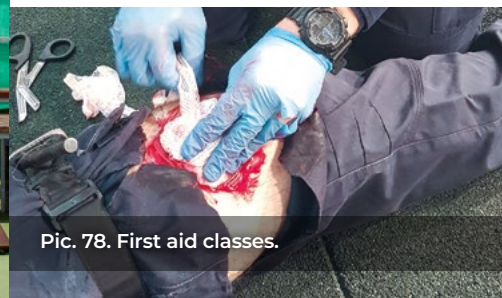

- ▶ for police officers recertifying their authorizations to perform tasks related to qualified first aid.

INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION

For many years, the Police Training Centre (PTC) has been cooperating with foreign police schools, training centers for representatives of law enforcement institutions and judicial authorities as well as international police organizations, including the European Union Agency for Law Enforcement Training (CEPOL). The PTC also implements various EU educational projects. The goals of this cooperation are: development and implementation of training projects on vocational curricula, organization of exchange programs and study visits, and exchange on curricula and teaching methodology, as well as exchange of experience and improvement of professional competence. The Centre is also often visited by foreign delegations arriving at the invitation of, among others, the Minister of the Internal Affairs and Administration or the Police Commander-in-Chief. During such visits, the Polish Police training model, laboratory equipment and equipment used in the course of didactic classes are presented.

COOPERATION WITH SOCIETY

The PTC takes an active part in the life of Legionowo city. Trainers and students of the PTC conduct classes on safety in local educational institutions, support the local Police in patrolling tasks and mass events securing.

During meetings in schools and kindergartens, police teachers discuss issues related to the prevention of addictions, safe rest by the water as well as principles of first aid, cyber threats and the principles of youth responsibility for criminal acts.

The PTC Open Day is also organized, which allows children and teenagers to see the unit. Stands, educational and informational materials and classes prepared for this occasion in the field of prevention are aimed at promoting safe behavior among children and the youth.

PUBLISHING

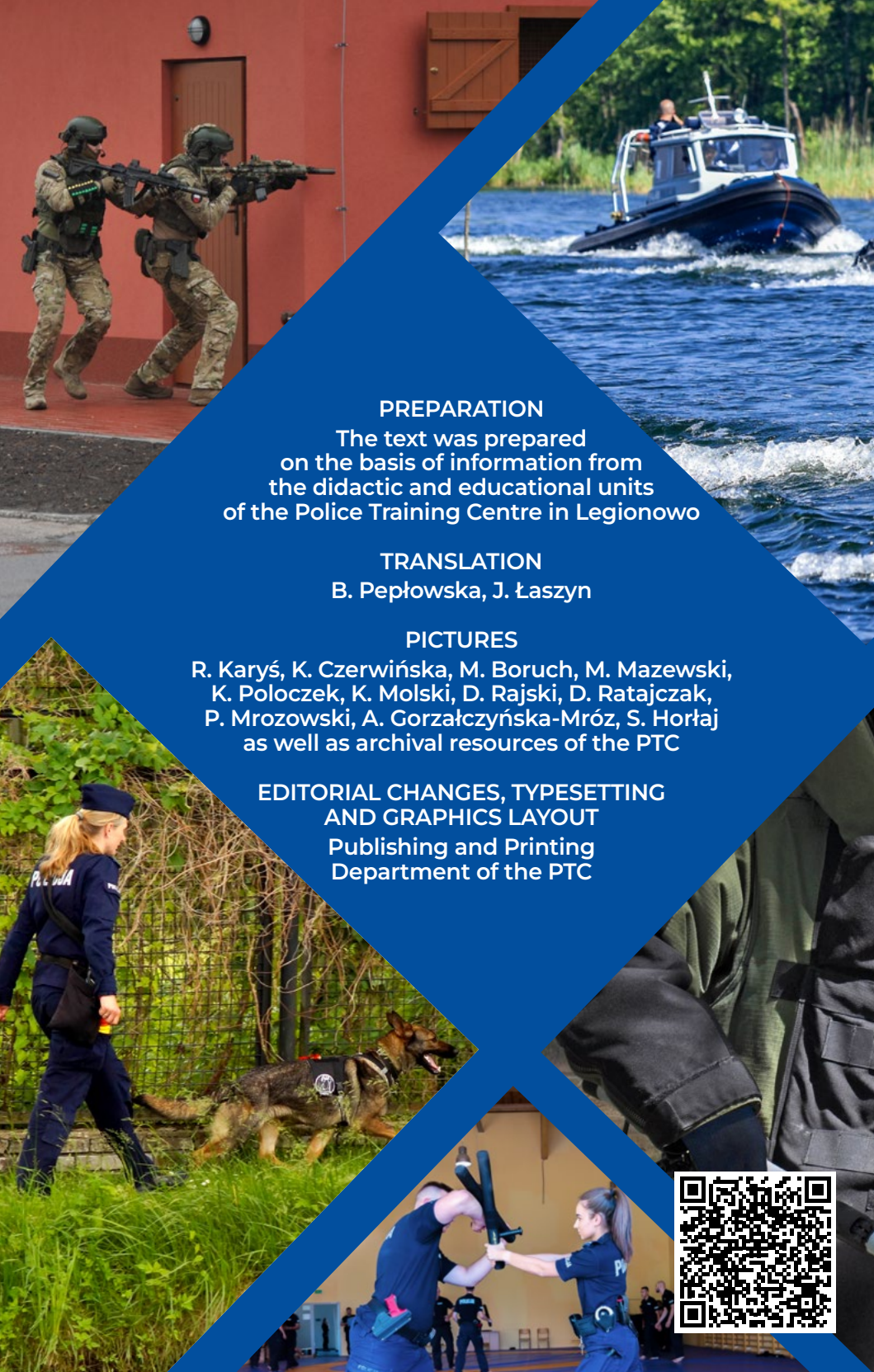
